Fears and Concerns


Exams and papers. This is a High Level Master so I did not want to fail!

Fears and Concerns


I was eager to return to an academic setting, but nervous that I may have a difficult time adjusting from work to student life once again.


My Global Agenda

Fears and Concerns



Fears and Concerns



Fears and Concerns


My biggest fear was that the program is not what I wanted and I would be bored in classes – not the case.

My biggest fear was meeting everyone. I have never studied abroad or lived in such an international atmosphere before. Luckily there was no reason to be scared.


My Global Agenda

Fears and Concerns




My Global Agenda

Fears and Concerns


I was afraid I would be homeless for a couple of days since the housing market is very competitive in the city of Aarhus.

Fears and Concerns



Fears and Concerns



My Global Agenda




My Global Agenda

Fears and Concerns




My Global Agenda

Fears and Concerns



Fears and Concerns



Fears and Concerns



Fears and Concerns



Fears and Concerns


I was mostly concerned with the never-ending nights and bad weather that characterize the Scandinavian region.

Fears and Concerns



Fears and Concerns



Fears and Concerns


My greatest concern is about making these two years really meaningful and worthwhile. An important part of that, beyond striving for optimum academic performance is forming long-lasting friendships.

Fears and Concerns




My Global Agenda

Fears and Concerns



Fears and Concerns



Fears and Concerns



Fears and Concerns



Lack of working experience. I got my bachelor degree only two months before starting this program. Even though I did some short internships in newspapers before, still I was not acquainted with practical news business.


My Global Agenda

Fears and Concerns



My Global Agenda



Fears and Concerns


Living in a very different country was my major concern. Cold weather, difficult language, different society – I was coming not only from another country, but from another continent.

Fears and Concerns


For me it's financial problems. I had to consider about the overall cost since it's really a huge expense to study and live abroad. Other than that, I was really excited to start a new chapter of my life.



My biggest fear is my "broken" English. Language is a big barrier to global "Respatialization". And by the way, are there rice cookers to be found in Aarhus?


My Global Agenda

Fears and Concerns


I was already in Aarhus and used to biking and the weather ;)


My Global Agenda

Fears and Concerns


